Chair's welcome continued...

We know there are challenging times ahead due to current policy and budgetary decisions and working together as an industry is important. At the April NFYFC Annual Meeting of Clubs (AMC), Young Farmers' Clubs voted by an overwhelming majority (98.9%) to pass a motion denouncing proposed changes to Inheritance Tax, signalling firm support for British farmers.

The motion was proposed by former YFC AGRI chair Luke Cox who asked members to agree that the proposed tax reforms would have a detrimental impact on the next generation of farmers and threaten the security of family farms.

I seconded the motion, highlighting how "the next generation is having to navigate more hurdles than ever before" and called for more representation in policy decisions. I'm pleased that a meeting was arranged with Defra in May to discuss the next generation's vision for the Uplands, as future land use and road maps are considered by policy makers.

I reiterate that we need to be listened to about what kind of industry we want to build – one that's resilient, fair and sustainable. This goes for our YFCs and our rural communities.

I know that you all play an active and positive role within your area of the country and please continue to shout about the great work that you do.

Back the Future

Farming the Future continues to support our collaborative projects

Following the conclusion of the 'How Farming Can Cool the Planet' project, plans were underway to devise another project to represent young people with a fervent interest in sustainable food, farming and the environment.

After a short project determining the nature of the next collaborative work and with the addition of Sustain and the Nature Friendly Farming Network as partners, 'Back the Future' was brought to life!

The project aims to bring together, upskill, articulate, and amplify diverse youth voices to influence policy around food and farming. After a rigorous application and interview process, six ambassadors were chosen to take part in the project and have now met in person at the YFC Centre, Stoneleigh Park.

We will compare ongoing survey feedback with the ambassadors' interests to agree on a plan of action. We've registered a variety of topics to pursue and determine what's feasible to deliver

- Act as a conduit between farmers and UKRI (regarding farmer-start-up businesses with ADOPT and the UK Agri-Tech Centre)
- Engage with different audiences (young, students, public) to raise awareness of the importance of good nutrition and source of food
- Input to and understanding of relevant policy work: Land Use, Food and Road Map strategies/visionsrepresenting the voice of farmers as well as young people (diverse voice representation)
- Input to The World Food Forum (WFF) National Chapter
- Present project work at the Oxford Farming Conference.

Understand more about how the WFF impacts agrifood systems

What is the WFF?

The World Food Forum (WFF), launched in 2021 as an independent network of partners hosted by the Food and Agriculture Organisation of the United Nations (FAO), is a global platform dedicated to transforming agrifood systems and accelerating progress toward the achievement of the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).

What are the aims?

Through youth action, science and innovation, and investment, the WFF fosters strategic partnerships and cross-sector collaborations to catalyse transformative change in agrifood systems at the local, regional and global levels, working towards a sustainable, resilient and hunger-free world, leaving no one behind.

What's the Youth Assembly?

The World Food Forum (WFF) Youth Assembly is a youth-led platform empowering young people to engage in policy discussions on agrifood systems challenges and opportunities. It provides a structured space for youth to systematically contribute to agrifood systems policy and governance processes, ensuring their voices influence local, regional and global decision-making.

What's the Youth Initiative?

Within this framework, the WFF's Global Youth Action Initiative (Youth Initiative) was established to harness the passion and power of youth to transform our agrifood systems. It acts as a catalytic movement and driver of youth engagement in food governance, and serves as a knowledge centre and innovation lab, fostering and inspiring youth-led solutions.

It actively contributes to the implementation of the United Nations Youth 2030 Strategy and enhances youth engagement in the follow-up of the 2021 United Nations Food Systems Summit.

The WFF Youth Initiative is implemented through a set of thematic programmes providing young people with the tools, knowledge and networks needed to create and scale actionable and sustainable solutions.

The programmes?

To inspire and empower youth worldwide by reflecting their diverse priorities and shared interests, the WFF Youth Initiative is structured around five thematic programmes. These programmes provide multiple avenues for youth engagement, ensuring inclusive and meaningful participation on a global scale.

They include:

- Youth Assembly
- Youth Innovation Lab
- Youth Education
- Youth Culture
- Local Youth Action = local vouth-driven initiatives.



Success at Cereals 2025

A dedicated programme of next generation events featured on the first day of Cereals 2025

Lincolnshire farmer and founder of Forage Aid, Andrew Ward MBE was the host for this year's Cereals event. Andrew is the Managing Director of Roy Ward Farms Ltd, an arable farmer, who has previously hosted Cereals in 2004 and 2008.

This year, Andrew was keen to ensure YFC members were supported. Working with Cereals event organisers, Lincolnshire and Nottinghamshire county federations and NFYFC, a next generation programme was developed, sponsored by Michelmores and supported by UK Agritech Centre, NFU and Sykes Holiday Cottages.

The sessions focused on business and careers advice, with an opportunity to network and enjoy the event with fellow YFC members and industry representatives.

NFYFC Chair of Council James Nixey chaired the proceedings, introducing the panel discussions: James said: "I was delighted to play an active part





in the dedicated day for young farmers. It was the perfect venue and programme for bringing everyone together to learn, socialise and swap good practice. It's always good to collaborate effectively with show organisers and industry."

There was positive feedback about repeating the programme at next year's event. NFYFC will continue to work with Cereals organisers to develop the topics based on YFC members' suggestions.

Growing the next generation of farmers

The Young Farmers' area included discussions on diversification, succession and innovation.

Nottinghamshire County Federation Vice Chair Jessica Spencer took part in the panel discussion on diversification (pictured left).

The range of speakers and variety of topics gave visitors at the Young Farmers' area a wealth of knowledge, information and experience from industry experts and those who have started successful enterprises and shared their journeys.

Recommendations from the experts for future diversification projects included the need for passion, research, planning permission, return on capital and to see that barriers can be opportunities.

There was wide agreement from the speakers about the benefits of YFC membership. They cited how YFC had created networks, confidence in public speaking and interviews, opportunities, support and encouragement for future careers.


LEAF Education works to engage, motivate, and inspire young people through active learning to equip future generations with a balanced and informed insight into food production, farming and the environment.

I am vital safety campaign

A new NAAC sticker campaign aims to remind everyone to stay safe

A new sticker campaign, launched by The National Association of Agricultural Contractors (NAAC), aims to remind everyone to stay safe with a simple message, *I am vital to UK Agriculture – Stay Safe*.

The NAAC is asking its contractor members and the wider farming community to join forces and remind each other that we are all vital by placing stickers in prominent places. The stickers should act as a prompt to always wear a helmet when riding a quad bike, make sure PTO guards are in place or switch off a machine before clearing a blockage.

Commenting Jill Hewitt, NAAC CEO, said, "It is all too easy when under pressure to think that health and safety is all about paperwork and hassle. However, the number of fatal and serious incidents in farming continues to remain stubbornly high and the NAAC wants to visually remind everyone to protect themselves and colleagues.

"We urge everyone to use these stickers as a heads

up to take that extra time to make sure a job is done safely and get everyone home to their families at the end of the day."

Safety tips

Contributory factors/underlying causes of accidents and injury with ATVs can include:

- lack of formal operator training and/or experience;
- incorrect/lack of appropriate head protection;
- excessive speed;
- age of the operator;
- carrying a passenger on a sit-astride ATV;
- unbalanced loads or overloading;
- tipping on a bank, ditch, rut or bump;
- loss of control on a steep slope combined with other factors, such as ground or load conditions;
- towing excessive loads with unbraked equipment;
- poor maintenance faulty brakes, incorrect tyre pressures.

Always remember to think 'farm safety'.
